

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

### **Breaking News!**

#### EMERGENCY FOOD RELIEF for EMALINDI & SHANYINYA

At this moment in time we are receiving devastating reports from some of our communities of starvation as a result of the soaring cost of food world wide. Costs have tripled within weeks. Coupled with a long dry spell and an ensuing failed crop, hunger is impacting hard on the people we assist. This month Fr. Paul buried some of his parishioners who starved to death and fears many more. He also witnessed the quarrel of two brothers over a 2 kg. bag of cornmeal which ended in the death of one of them. We have wired emergency food funds for 52 households(approx. 400 people) in Emalindi. We also wired funds for Shanyinya following reports from David that another 62 households there were facing imminent starvation. A total of over 1,000 people will be sustained in this crisis. Long term we will focus on setting up more permanent solutions for food sustainability projects such as more Poultry Projects. Our administrator David has been hard at work delivering the 6&1/2 tons of maize and beans for distribution. The story is told in more photos on our website. #### Focus on Hunger as Food Prices Soar Worldwide



According to the United Nations 2010 statistics, Sub Saharan Africa has the highest prevalence of hunger. One in three are malnourished and hungry. It has certainly been the experience of our teams working in poor rural communities in western Kenya .We work with those who are often not guaranteed to have one meal a day. People who are chronically hungry do not have the energy they need to live active lives. This makes it hard to study, work or fight off diseases and opportunistic infections. Hunger is particularly harmful for women and children.

Malnourished children do not develop physically healthy bodies and mentally they develop more slowly. Hungry mothers often give birth to weak babies who are at great risk for death and disability. We have learned from health co-ordinator Sr. Agnes Khati of the high incidence of complications during delivery for these malnourished mothers. The many resulting disabled children are then placed in overcrowded and underfunded institutions. It is a downward spiral of cascading crises. It is for this reason SFA very often begins work in a new community with the setting up of a feeding program for orphans and vulnerable children and their community caregivers. Once the nutritional boost is in place we try to fund a self sustaining project to bring in food and funds for their future. In the past these projects have included poultry projects, farming plots and a woman's sewing co operative. Please see back issues on our website at suitcasesforafrica.com




# Chevoso , Shamberere & Shitochi Communities

There is a new sense of hope as SFA Feeding Programs began operating here in January. Monthly Support Days lift their spirits and ease their hunger. Our Administrator Susan and Sr. Agnes Khati set up the distribution of food staples such as flour, maize, and beans. Each community then celebrates together with songs and moral support for each other. A special treat of bread and juice is enjoyed by all. At this event the group receives health and nutrition advice. All children and their caregivers also receive deworming medications to combat illness by parasites often contracted from contaminated drinking water.



#### The Story of Isabella's Well

**Isabella Shisiliboti's** story is one of sadness to all of us at SFA. It is a very typical story of the great tragedy now unfolding across sub Saharan Africa due to the AIDS Pandemic. SFA honours her memory with a new well in Shanyinya.



We met ten year old Isabella last summer on our visits to Mukumu Children's Home. Isabella had been abandoned at the hospital nearby due to the high cost of her medical care and the graveness of her illness. It was impossible for her grandmother to manage. Isabella's mother and father both died in quick succession when she was two years old, followed by the loss of her brother. The virus had been transmitted to all three

siblings. Grace and the children at Mukumu Home became her family in the last few months of her life. Though only given a week to live at that point in time, with care, and medication, her health improved. She became a much loved part of their lives. At the time, the children were falling ill with cholera and typhus due to an unclean water source. Thanks to funds raised by St. Edmund & St. Georges churches to assist us, the Mukumu /Likhule Well was completed to improve that situation. Unfortunately, Isabella fell ill before the well's completion and in her weakened state was unable to recover. She passed away in early January, 2011.

We hoped to build a well to honor the life of this brave little girl. Fortunately a donor came forward. We are very grateful to the employees of **AIR** CANADA **VACATIONS** Co. Through their efforts this well is now a reality. David Eshihuula oversaw the work and chose the location. The well is located in Shanyinya.

In David's words..." It is a stone's throw away from Isabella's final resting place. It will impact the community here greatly as they know the great difficulties Isabella and her family lived". Isabella's grandmother and her one remaining brother are living there still. It is called Isabella's Well and all who draw water there will be asked to say a prayer in memory of Isabella and all children who suffer from the hardship of AIDS. "



#### St. Joseph's Home for Disabled Children







The children living in this home are suffering from a wide range of disabilities such as epilepsy, paralysis and intellectual handicaps. The staff members are caring and gentle with these children but living conditions are very difficult. On the left Sr. Josephata is seen feeding the children in her "dining room" which is a circle of benches under a tree. Our driver John pitches in to help feed a young girl. Many need assistance. There is great need here.

As we left our visit with the children last July they were preparing for their afternoon nap on the grass outdoors ... much more preferable to sleeping in the hot tin shacks of the boys and the broken beds of the girls.

In January 2011, thanks to the generosity of Alveda Pharma in Toronto, we began funding some much needed medications to treat epilepsy and other medications for the coming year. The fund will also allow for the purchase over time, of much needed equipment for both occupational and physiotherapy, learning materials, and wheelchairs.
