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Update on the Beraldo Family Clinic

"The story of the Beraldo Family Clinic and Resource Centre is a story of love and compassion. It is a story about the difference you can make in peoples' lives. Commissioned 5 months ago, it now serves the poor rural community of Emalindi. I undertook this work with SFA knowing that the lives of these people will never be the same."

Relief Arrives for Many as the Emalindi Community Receives Both Eye and Dental Care

"The entire Emalindi community heaved a sigh of relief when an outreach program for eye and dental care came to the Clinic. I was really touched and



impressed with the heart of sister Lillian of Kisumu Diocese who laid down most logistics. I met Sister Lillian in Maseno with her team of dental and eye doctors. She readily accepted to carry out the outreach program. I fueled the van full of medical equipment and we arrived at the clinic at 11am. We were shocked and at the same time touched by the crowd that had come for

treatment and medical care. Many people in this community had stayed in excruciating pain with toothaches just because they could not afford treatment. Mary Opondo came with all her molars and premolars worn out and in deep pain. The crowd was so big that we could not finish attending to all the people. We promised to come again for this medical outreach program."

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The Visiting Medical Specialists Hold Day long Clinics. This is Life Changing Access to Care.














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Kevin's Story...

How a young boy's life has been changed by sponsorship. Told in the words of our administrator Susan Nanjala aka "Mama Susan"

"When Kevin was chosen to be sponsored by SFA he was able to be withdrawn

With him is Julia a member of the Khayega Women's sewing group who accepted to take up Kevin as his new care giver. That was the beginning of a new life for Kevin. In the bag in the photo are maize and beans that were given to them from our office to support them with food. Under the care of Julia, he joined Julia's youngest son by name Zakayo. He then had somebody to play with though Zakayo is a little bit older than Kevin."



"Julia became a rescue mother to Kevin. A new child and a new mother. No smile yet."

And how is Kevin doing now? Please read on.....

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A Happy Joyful Boy!

"One afternoon, we went to distribute school bags and shoes to the sponsored children. The activity was very successful. The education sponsored children were very, very, happy. I have never seen them so happy as they were that day. They sang and danced and made all sorts of fun. The person who surprised me most was Kevin. He was unbelievably active, singing and dancing with the others. I saw his teeth out throughout our stay there (i.e. smiling). The boy has changed and he looks relaxed. I am attaching the pictures of the event. See for

yourself the happiness on the face of the boy. He was a boy who could never smile or respond to any communication.

Kevin and Trizar are the youngest in the educational sponsorship group and they are both in the same grade (grade 2). Both have an amazing performance and it is quite encouraging to us. As seen in the picture.....

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
The Educational Sponsorship Program to Expand

We are very excited about the ongoing success of the Educational Sponsorship Program. Susan Nanjala developed the program for 30 children and administers it for us. Each child receives a school uniform, and school supplies. All school fees and exam fees are paid and every child receives a hot nourishing meal each school day. In May 2012 Wendy and Charlotte enjoyed time with them, bringing letters and photos from their Canadian sponsors. The children were happy to receive them and to write back. We have just added 10 more children to the program for 2013.









Wycliffe is happy now!

Although some of the children may not yet have high marks academically they are all passing and doing their best. In many cases they must fetch water and firewood and do many chores each night. It is a long hard day for them with little chance to study.

One child Wycliffe was not allowed to go to school because he had to work for the family. He would sneak away to school because he wanted to go so much even if it meant a beating. He has now been sponsored in our program and is happily attending. It is hard for us to even imagine what that was like for him. His future depends on this. Even just attaining a grade 8 level of education makes a huge difference in holding a job other than manual labour for \$1.00 a day. **Life Changing!**

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A STORY OF HOPE AND INSPIRATION

While in Kenya in 2009 the team had the pleasure of meeting a small support group by the name of Maisha Mapya - which means New Life. We were so impressed with this gathering of HIV positive people whose purpose was to support each other and learn how to live happy productive lives. Each year we have visited this enthusiastic support group and each year we are overwhelmed & humbled by their determination, their strength and their dignity. Last year we decided to fund a cow project by purchasing two cows. The group is divided into eight subgroups of five members. Each subgroup of five will eventually receive a cow and once that objective has been met the members of each subgroup will receive a calf once it is born to the group. We are very pleased with the commitment shown by all members and how they support each other to help make each project a success.

This year Charlotte & Wendy had the pleasure of spending a couple of hours visiting with the members of Maisha Mapya and were thrilled to see so many of them doing well. It certainly was a joyous occasion. During the course of their visit they heard many tributes to the wonderful support available to each and every one of them from Susan Nanjala who is much more than our administrator on this project. One person's story stood out and we requested that she write her testimony down and forward it to us so we could share it with you all. Below is Carolyne's story - it is a tale of faith, hope and determination. We hope you find it as inspiring as we did when we heard it first hand.

Carolyne's Story

"My name is Carolyne Nasimiya Nyongesa. I am a widow age 36yrs, and residing in Kakamega town, Western Kenya. I was born and brought up in Bungoma District where I went to school

and managed to do my O level examination and scored a mean grade of C plain. I enrolled and completed a Diploma in Building Construction in 1995. Before I secured a job I got married in 1999 to a handsome young man and was blessed with a bouncing baby boy named Shawn Obore. He is 13 yrs. and now he is the only child I have. He is in class six at Kakamega Primary. I tested HIV+ve in the year 2000. During that time in Kenya, there were no interventions like ARVs (antiretrovirals) and no psychological counseling



as it is today. On learning of my HIV status, I simply gave up on everything. I did not look for a job or plan for anything. I thought I would die the next day or the next week or after a year. But days, weeks, months and years passed without that death coming. I am now 12 years down the line and now I am full of life and hope."

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"My husband also tested HIV +ve. He lived a reckless life with multiple sexual partners and abusing alcohol. He did not seek proper medical attention as advised by doctors and finally succumbed to opportunistic infections and passed away in 2008. I suffered a major opportunistic infection of Tuberculosis in 2004 after my second pregnancy. All through the pregnancy I was in and out of hospital due to malaria and anemia. My baby passed away after a month and this really broke my heart. Then my first born child, Shawn, who was always sickly, also tested HIV+ve and believe it or not I was completely heartbroken because the three of us in the family were now HIV+ve. Life became unbearable and things could not move, worse, my husband was never cooperative at all. I wished I had just died."

"My son and I were both enrolled in comprehensive care at Kakamega Hospital. Later we were

referred to Maisha Mapya Support Group for psychological support where I met Mama Susan, a nurse counselor affiliated with the Catholic Diocese of Kakamega. Mama Susan gave me all the necessary psychological support and my life started changing. I started to restore hope in my life and vowed to do anything so as to prolong my life and lead a positive life.

In the support group I met people who were also infected with HIV and we all received counseling by Mama Susan. I became a very strong member of the group and was elected by members to be the secretary of the group. I was exposed to other support groups and networks and was empowered with knowledge on HIV and this strengthened me more. I started appreciating myself and I am now leading a positive life thanking

God for every day of life he gives me."

"In the support group I have been empowered socially, physically and economically. I have been able to attend several trainings on income generating activities (IGAs) and borrowed a loan of Ksh.20,000 (just over \$200) from a micro credit society where I joined as a member paying only Ksh.200 (just about \$2) per month. The money I borrowed enabled me to put up a small hair dressing salon in town. From this business I have been able to sustain my life and provide food for my child and also cater for our medical bills. I am also struggling to put up a semi-permanent house in my rural home since my husband had not constructed any family house. It is quite expensive but I will have a place to call home however long as it takes. I am praying to God to give me strength, ability and good health so that my dreams of having a house of my own and for my child will come true."

"Now after realizing that life is God given and it is only God who knows when to take life from a person, I am a changed Carolyne. Last year, 2011, my desire was to go back to college and to pursue a diploma in social work inspired me. I was enrolled in college in January 2012. The course will take 2yrs. I am struggling to ensure that I pursue this diploma course and later a degree and get a Masters, if God is willing."

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
"Also I am grateful to our almighty God to have enabled me to live up to today and be able to share this Testimony and experience of my journey of life with HIV. I have been able to escape death not once but twice. When I was started on ARVs I suffered adverse side effects and that saw me hospitalized because of liver problems. I escaped death narrowly and I thank the Doctors and Nurses who gave me the necessary medical attention and restored my life. I was also treated for TB - a killer chest infection in HIV positive people - but I took my treatment well and completed the course of treatment as recommended. I was completely cured after completion of the TB regimen."

"Finally I wish to thank all those who have assisted me to be what I am today. I am full of Life and Hope and very healthy until I have forgotten that I am HIV positive. I appreciate all Doctors, Nurses, counselors, the Diocese of Kakamega, my support group and all donors who have stood with us to fund our ARVs. Through the Diocese of Kakamega ARVs have come from Canada and assisted

HIV positive persons in Kenya. We could not be here today to give this testimony but I must say that I am really full of life and yearning to do more and not just for myself but for the entire community."

"Special appreciation also goes to SUITCASES FOR AFRICA for their concern over my welfare and the welfare of the Maisha Mapya Support Group and for being able to show us what can be described as unconditional support. I wish to salute you all and God bless you."

"Thank you so much."

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Emalindi Orphan Hostel.....Help is on the way..




During our 2011 trip to Kenya, we were introduced to Sr. Salome by Fr. Paul and we learned about the huge challenges being faced by herself and Sr. Beatrice who were attempting to assist and feed many local orphans. They were trying to feed 85 children one meal a day and housing 18 of them to sleep. It was an urgent matter and rapidly growing in size. We immediately began with some emergency food donations and the students of John Abbott College raised funds to build them a poultry raising project. We addressed the terrible sanitation issue by replacing the two toppling, wooden, and over-filled latrines with 4 new, efficient and well-designed concrete ones. Their living conditions still remain difficult. The sisters now house 72 orphans! There are few beds and mattresses and those they have, are broken and unsanitary. The roof of the structure leaks with a mattress stuffed into it to block the rain. The children still have to fetch water and they bathe in a cobbled together shack of rusty corrugated iron. We have decided to make the hostel one of our main focuses for 2013. Hopefully with funds we raise we can give these children a better quality of life by improving the dormitory and furnishing it. A clean water project would be a dream. The colorful squares many of you knitted were put together by the children last spring: NOW THEY NEED BEDS. We will keep you posted as funds come in and work gets underway.

Avery kept wondering how she could make a difference in the world. Not long after this the principal of the school, Nathia Messina and the lunch program co-ordinator Louise Cavalier offered to teach interested students how to knit.

That is when Avery's imagination kicked in. She began knitting scarves and soon had quite a



stock. Avery decided to donate the money that she made selling the scarves to SFA. Avery's mother Stephanie had worked with Wendy Buchanan and had followed SFA for a long time. The new shoes will protect the children from painful effects of parasites known as "jiggers" which burrow into the feet to lay their eggs. They cause terrible infections and pain and are endemic. Many children and adults suffer from them and if untreated they are debilitating and make walking difficult.






