Introducing our Special Needs Children

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In this newsletter edition we would like to share with you some of the photos and projects featuring Special Needs Children. We all agree these children are close to our hearts and the days spent with them are always among the happiest.



Special Needs Children Have a Special Place in our Hearts.

If you were to ask any of the SFA members who have travelled to the projects or any of the young people who have accompanied us there, this simple question...

"What was your favorite day?"

We are sure for most the answer would be:

"Visiting with the special needs children of St. Ursula, in Chamakanga or St. Joseph the Worker in Malava"

The joy and excitement of the children at receiving visitors warms our hearts, especially knowing that visitors are rare. Due to old superstitions and the stigma of shame, these children are often marginalised by society and literally hidden away. Thanks to dedicated community healthcare workers who actively search for these children and who also educate the community about their needs and potential that dynamic is beginning to change. On the following pages we will introduce you to some of the projects and the children. Prepare to lose your hearts to them also....

St Ursula School in Chamakanga

We first met the children of St. Ursula on our very first trip to Kenya in 2006. It was heartbreaking to see the conditions these children lived in. Thanks to our donors, this facility has come a long, long way since that time.

We had learned from the caring staff that often after carrying the most severely disabled children a fair distance to the stream to bathe them, they would be turned away by angry community members who did not want them in the water with them.



One of our first SFA projects involved the creation of a dam at a nearby stream. A pump house was installed and a piping system was able to bring water all the way up to the dormitories for bathing the children with dignity. This was a turning point. Life began to improve with each passing year.

The head teacher Mr. Karani and his dedicated staff provide love, care and stability for the children. Their goal is always to help the children reach their potential.



- Over the years SFA completely renovated the dormitories and supplied new beds and mosquito nets.
- Colorful artwork, done by Canadian high school students, helped to brighten their living conditions.
- We began to bring over desperately needed wheelchairs so bed ridden children could get outdoors.
- Books and toys for special needs children as well as physiotherapy equipment followed.

Special Needs Assistance continues throughout 2013-14

The uniforms funded by SFA in 2013 were made in class by the students in the dressmaking course. The children who are able are trained in various vocational programs to help them prepare to become self-supporting in the future. The school teaches wood working courses, housekeeping and child minding courses.






At the present time we are funding the construction of desks and chairs for a preschool class at Itegero Primary School. The work is to be carried out by the children in the wood working program at St. Ursula. We hope to encourage more and more local area schools to begin to link up with this resource which will benefit all.

Once again in 2014 Emergency Food is high on our priority list for these

children. We regularly fund deliveries of staples like maize, beans and rice to St. Ursula School each year and the purchase of medicines and food at St. Joseph.





St. Joseph the Worker, Malava

When we travel to Kenya we usually have a jam packed schedule of visits and meetings. One of our favourite activities, when time permits, is to spend some time with the children at St. Joseph the Worker in Malava.

In October 2013 Michele and Wendy took some bubbles to the orphanage to play with and the children were thrilled to see all the colours in the bubbles and to watch them float up and up on the breeze. Squeals of laughter rang out as we all enjoyed being together for as long as our schedule allowed.

Mwirembe Primary School Banana Plantation, We are Ready for Expantion!





We are very excited to report that the Pilot Project to grow bananas at the school is going very well. The students and staff of the school have been tending the banana plants under the guidance of of an agronomyst since they was planted in September of 2013. The 100 plants are doing very well. We expect the first crop of bananas to feed the children will be ready to harvest this Autumn. We are pleased to have received the funding to double the plantation to 200 plants thanks in part to the generous members of St. George's Anglican Church in Ste. Anne de Bellevue. As this plantation matures and extra bananas are grown they can be sold to purchase other food staples such as maize and beans for a Feeding

St. James Anglican Church Women's Group



Cathy Roberts' two grade 5 classes at Birchwood enthusiastically wrote and illustrated their books while asking questions about students in Kenya.






SFA's 2nd Annual Walk-a-Thon. Saturday, September 27th at Centennial Lake in D.D.O.
