### Coping with Covid in Kenya

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This newsletter edition will feature the impact of Covid 19 on life in Kenya and our community projects.

### Report from the field

Covid 19 took most of the world by sudden surprise in late February of 2020. Countries coped to varying degrees by implementing restrictions, quarantines and emergency measures. It caused chaos, suffering, illness, death and the up-ending of life as we have known it. It continues as we write



this edition of the 2021 Winter/Spring Newsletter. Our SFA team was on the ground in Kenya visiting the projects in late February and had only just returned to Canada as countries began to lock down their borders in March. Kenya has been coping with all of the above.



In the rural areas where SFA works the impact has been sorely felt. Kenya has a population of 51 million and yet has only 537 ICU beds for those who need them and 256 ventilators nation-wide. Three quarters of those essential medical services are located in Nairobi and Mombasa. The Kakamega region where we work is a nine hour drive away from Nairobi.

As a result there is a higher mortality rate in this rural area. There is a lack of fuel for ambulances, a lack of testing and of tracing, resulting in overburdened referral hospitals according to Chibanzi Mwachhonda, Secretary General of the Kenyan Medical Practitioners,

Pharmacists and Dental Unions. (Reuters)

We have the good fortune to have a hardworking dedicated team in Kenya. Susan and Esther are working in the midst of all these challenges to do the best they can for our sponsored students despite their own fears of being part of the "at risk" category medically. # EDUCATION PROGRAM UPDATE 2020 ACADEMIC YEAR; REPORTED January 26, 2021:

Following Covid19 outbreak in our Country in March 2020, Schools and all education institutions closed indefinitely on  $18^{TH}$  March. The whole nation was thrown into confusion, despair and fear of the unknown. Strict measures were put



in place with hope that the spread could be curbed and learning could resume within the shortest time possible, but that was not the case. As days and months went by, Covid19 morbidity /mortality rates increased causing more fear in the nation, families and individuals. The students' break went on until October 2020 when the government decided to reopen Universities and Middle level colleges, primary grades 4&8 plus high school Form 4's being candidates.

A number of infections and deaths were reported in the opened institutions but the government and the Ministry of Health was able to control the spread. The affected institutions were closed for two weeks. Learning resumed again after the two week break once the schools were fumigated.

Since the Corona Virus was not being eradicated, the W.H.O advised that Nations should learn how to live with the Virus the way we have lived with Hiv/Aids and other Communicable diseases. This prompted the government to announce the reopening of all schools 4th January 2021.

Families and school going children went through a lot of challenges including gender based violence, early marriages, teenage pregnancies, substance drug abuse and alcoholism. Some families separated. Workers lost their jobs after the industries they were working in foreclosed. Suicide was rampant among adults and children. Psychological problems increased due to economic challenges. Some private schools closed too and they have not been reopened.

Because of the whole confusion during the Covid break, we were prompted to take inventory of our SFA/CCTD Sponsored Students.

We continued with our follow up checks through phone calls with families and our ground coordinators. After school opened we were also able to speak to some students once connected by caregivers or ground coordinators.

The students did not have an easy time to be at home for that long period of time. Some could not relate well with their parents/guardians/caregivers forcing them to move from one family to the other. Some have still not been found. Some parents/ guardians/ caregivers had not known the behaviors / characters of their children. By being together for that long period of time, parents found out that they could not control the children at home. There was also an issue of parents being analog versus the digital students, causing a gap.

While the sponsored children were in school, parents were relieved from providing them with lunches but this changed suddenly when schools closed. It was not easy for parents to provide for food and other basic needs. Prices of basic commodities shot up given that there was a lock down and curfews. Parents felt that children were better off being at school where they respected their teachers more than their parents.

Some students especially boys looked for casual jobs to do and others did the boda boda services (driving motorbike and scooter taxies) It made them become money centered and therefore had little or no time to read/revise.

Due to idleness and less supervision some girls who involved themselves in sexual activities found themselves pregnant as in the case of two of our students. All these challenges occurred because of their confused state of mind and being unsure of what the future holds for them. They were totally disoriented. Some students were lucky to be involved in online learning which occupied them. However not all students were able to access online school. We tried to link them with internet café sites but the price was very high and became unworkable. We attempted to print work for them but the cost of printing tripled again not working. We are continuing to meet as we go forward.

# **Benedict's Story.... A New Chapter Begins**

When we first thought to start our education sponsorship program in 2010 it was in response to a great need for assistance for families who hoped to educate their children but couldn't manage the fees. In Kenya education is "free" but each student must provide their own uniforms, the necessary school supplies such as pencils, exercise books etc. & pay all exam and test fees. For



many families this was out of their realm of possibility. When struggling to feed and house a family, education costs are an added burden and often out of the question.

Our administrator Susan brought this to our attention and asked if there was any way we could help. Susan worked up a budget based on what the cost was per student and we came home very excited and determined to find a way to help. Thankfully it did not take long before we had a very dedicated group of enthusiastic donors willing to take on the challenge. The first year we committed to sending seventy-five dollars per student and we started with twenty-seven students enrolled in our program. In discussions with Susan it was agreed that we would pledge to see these eager student through their primary education – Grade 8. Once a student achieved this level they would be eligible for an apprenticeship program for any number of trade courses. We all thought this was a lofty goal. Many students were very behind academically for their age group but they persevered – as did their sponsors who supported them regardless of how many years it took them to progress each year. As our students achieved their Grade 8 successfully it became apparent that they were anxious to continue. Once again our wonderful sponsors agreed to continue through High School. Such confidence and support was enthusiastically received by the students and we now have 6 graduates who are pursuing post-secondary education!!

Benedict is one of our graduates. He has struggled academically on & off throughout his primary & high school experience but he put in the time and the effort needed to graduate. Benedict has experienced a very difficult home life with little or no support for schooling. He is now working hard to realize his dream of continuing his education to become a priest!



It was an exciting time for Benedict preparing for this new chapter in his life. Thanks to the generous help from his sponsor and a modest sum collected and donated by his own parish, he was on his way!

Our administrator Susan accompanied him as he went shopping for all the items he would need to begin his new studies. They decided to shop for second hand items in order to make his funds go further. By the end of the day he was able to purchase some clothes and shoes and a suitcase to hold them.

We are very proud of Benedict and all that he has achieved. We all feel like his surrogate parents as do his "Canadian Family" who has supported him all the way! Benedict is currently registered at St. Augustine's Missionary Congregation for Catholic Priests where he will be studying for 9-10 years.

Benedict is in our prayers & we wish him well as he travels this path.







To date we have assisted over eighty students since we took on this challenge. We appreciate all of our dedicated sponsors who have maintained strong bonds with their student(s) through their annual letters and photos. This by far exceeded all of our expectations.

### Indulusia & Shamoni Well Updates

We are pleased to share that both of our recent well installations are functioning despite challenges. Unfortunately some regions in Kenya are still experiencing drought conditions. The dry spell has been triggered by lack of significant rain for the last 12 months. The water tables in affected regions have gone down drastically. The Kenyan government says the situation is likely to get worse if climate change delays the rainy season in March. Climate change is already having a huge effect on Kenya causing both floods and drought.



The well at Indulusia Primary School is functioning despite dry conditions.

The Shamoni Community well is facing reduced water levels and the water can only be pumped early in the morning before it runs dry.

Our reliable contractor Steven will soon be working on deepening the well a little in the hope of increasing more access to water.
